The WUR Power Diagram

Whether you just started your studies or are already in Wageningen for several years, it can be useful to understand how the legal power at the WUR is organised and to know the faces that belong to it. Especially, this might help you avoid the awkward situation of not recognizing the heads of the WUR. Also, it is good to realise that students have a legal saying in how things are organised at the University. There are several (official) ways of doing so:

First of all, you can decide to run for the annual Student Council elections and try to make a direct change by meeting the Executive Board several times a year. You can join either as an independent member, or via one of the student parties: S&I, CSF or VeSte. The Student Council has more power than you might think! Besides their rights of approval, advise and information, they have the right of initiative, which means that they are authorised to make proposals either to the Executive Board or through other networks of WUR.

It might also be that politics is not your ambition, but you are unhappy about your study programme or the way of teaching at WUR. In that case, you can consider joining the Board of Education and have your voice heard there instead.

It is, of course, also possible that you are generally unhappy about how things are going at WUR. Then, I advise you to vote for the next national elections, as the Supervisory Board is appointed by the ministers.



Board of Education

They manage all the study programmes. It consists of 4 professors and 4 students. The dean of education, Arnold Bregt, chairs this board.



Supervisory Board

They appoint the members of the Executive Board and give them advice. Currently, Jeroen Dijsselbloem is their chair. The members of the Supervisory Board are appointed by the Minister of Agriculture, Nature and Food Quality and the Minister of Education, Culture and Science. Names to remember: Paulien Herder, Mariënne Verhoef, Robert Smith, Siem Korver, Tjarda Klimp & Jeroen Dijsselbloem.

Executive Board

They are responsible for the management and administration of Wageningen University and Research. Arthur Mol is the Rector Magnificus of the University and vice-chair of the Executive Board. Chair Louise Fresco is responsible for the Research part. Rens Buchwaldt is a general member and in charge of the porfolio Finance, Business & Services.



WUR's Spokeswoman

Annet Blanken is the new spokeswoman of the Executive Board. She is responsible for the communication between the Executive Board and the 'outside world', including students.



WUR Council

The WUR Council is an informative consultative body to the Executive Board, where all of WUR's (university and research) participatory bodies, including the Student Council, meet. The council itself doesn't have any formal rights, but the participatory bodies do.



Student Council

They fight for our rights! Six times a year, they meet the Executive Board to, for example, try to prevent evening lectures. Every spring, student elections take place.

What motivated them to put more time and effort into hosting a satirical birthday party than they put into their degrees? Two XR rebels tell their stories.

f your family is anything like mine, then you will have spent a lot of time over the Christmas holidays pretending to be a different person. Letting your conservative grandparents, for example, believe that there's a chance that you'll one day straighten out and get a boyfriend. Or keeping your mouth shut when everyone starts getting enthusiastic about your cousin's new job marketing for coca-cola. For me, these already-corona-tense holidays have been spent avoiding conflict by portraying an image that I know is going to keep everyone happy and prevent them from asking too many uncomfortable questions.

I'm sure the board of WUR would find this very relatable. Recently, student campaigns have been shedding light on the fact that Wageningen University has also been putting on an act - except WUR's false advertising isn't just for Christmas. I came to Wageningen this summer to attend what I naively saw as some sort of environmentally-utopic university. Instead, I found a bunch of rightfully pissed-off students and a university whose greenest feature might just be its marketing scheme.

With disheartening disappointment, I discovered that beneath WUR's green facade lies a business that prioritises

the private agendas of exploitative corporations above what it claims to stand for. A business that fails to abolish its colonial mindset, and supports pollution, deforestation, soil degradation, child labour, the oppression of small farmers, and all the other environmental and social suffering associated with industrial agriculture. It's incredibly sad that even a world-class centre for supposedly independent environmental research and education has failed to rise above the deluge of bullshit that we're all swimming in.

After learning all of this, we got together with a group





Conflicting Interests

investigation into scientific transparency

The time that scientists were figuring out how gravity works or whether the earth spins around the sun or the other way around is over. The academic institutions yesteryear have changed dramatically, professors are no longer the unquestioned top of the scientific society - now they have to fight for research funding. The Dutch government stimulates cooperation between universities and the private sector: universities only receive government funding when a certain part of their research is paid for by businesses. Those exact same businesses have interests, massive interests, and now they seem to have found a way to explore them.

Since 2015, government funding has decreased and the private sector has increased their spending research. This has led to more and more professors and teachers with additional positions outside the universitu chairholders and more of research groups being paid directly by businesses.

This cooperation has the potential to be very fruitful, a closer link with the real world could make research more topical. However, this cooperation also increases the risk of possible conflict of interests. Can a professor who is fully paid by FrieslandCampina still conduct truly objective research into the dairy industry? It is good to realise how tied those bonds are. Wageningen University and Research is the sole knowledge institute for the Dutch Ministry of Agriculture, Nature and Food Safety, receiving a yearly €95.5 million for research from this government department.

No other university in the country receives research funding from this ministry, despite the presence of agricultural and/or environmental faculties in universities in Groningen, Utrecht, Leiden, and Amsterdam. So it should not come as a surprise that Wageningen is the perfect place for agriculture, nature, and food corporations to get a finger in the pie.

The Dutch agricultural policies have created one of the most efficient food-producing nations. Even Sir David Attenborough praised this in his newest documentary: "The Dutch have become experts at getting the most out of every hectare. Despite its

size, the Netherlands is now the world's second-largest exporter of food." But Attenborough has overlooked some very unsustainable consequences of this production: pollution due to excessive emission of nitrogen and phosphorous, biodiversity loss, world market disruption due to low food prices, dangerous exposure to chemical plant protection products, soil degradation, and rural exodus, to name a few. Wageningen University and Research continues to play a crucial role in the development of these policies. How do we know for sure that the private sector has not influenced the research that led to these policies?

Transparency?

When asked about cooperation with the private sector, the WUR says that they are open about this: "The 'affiliations' are mentioned on the internet and in scientific publications and in press releases - if applicable - funders are also mentioned." In 2007 all Dutch Universities signed an agreement that all additional

of professors positions have to be mentioned public pages. their But now, 13 years later, Foodwatch found that these agreements are not sufficiently adhered to. 46% of the food professors at WUR are not completely transparent about their affiliations. According to Investico, 80% of the Professors that are transparent Dutch professors have additional functions

> and about one-third of these functions are not publicly shared. When these affiliations stay out of sight, it is impossible to see which interests a professor represents and how these interests influence the professor's research. Therefore, independence and objectivity academia are structurally compromised. Cooperation between universities and the private sector will never be without conflicts of interests or the appearance thereof. But only 100% transparency can protect academic integrity.

Leeuwen(borch) and Friends: A Story

Once upon a time, when the northern grounds of the city of Wageningen were still made up of green and open land, kids spent their afternoons splashing water in the pond and climbing the (then-existing) variety of trees.

Among these kids was a group of friends. There was Gaia, shy and beautiful, who spent her days devising a plan to cross the pond without getting her skirt wet. There was Atlas, tall and majestic, who wore knitted sweaters and, instead of curls, had a cleanly-shaved head. There was also Lumen, the extrovert, who was more often seen atop a tree than on the ground. And then there was Leeuwen, little Leeuwen, who was never as cool as his friends. His



Does WUR contribute to global dialogue?

Since last summer, another bare field on the Wageningen Campus has been transformed into a construction site. Cranes, fences, and excavators are now blocking your first glimpse of Wageningen University. This is for the building of the Dialogue Centre, which should, rhetorically speaking, open our perspectives. The building of the Centre is expected to be finished in January 2022 and is going to cost 7.9 million euros. This makes it worth questioning: what is going to happen there? And how does this contribute to the Wageningen University goals?

ageningen University is not shy in their statements about the importance of having a dialogue. The opening of the academic year 2019/2020 had as its theme 'Dialogue: an academic responsibility'. Furthermore, the Strategic Plan 2018-2021 is titled 'Finding Answers Together'. Phrases such as 'societal dialogues', 'co-creation', 'from individual performance to team performance', and 'expand collaboration with other universities and external partners' are omnipresent within

the Strategic Plan. If there is one thing that becomes clear after reading this plan, it is that Wageningen University can not tackle the global food, environment, and health challenges alone. They need others. And dialogues can help.

Beyond conversation

Dialogues are defined by WUR as going beyond a conversation or debate. Instead of one person obtaining the 'right' answer, it is assumed that multiple partners have a little part of the answer. By going into dialogue

with each other they can collectively find, or co-create, these answers. WUR recognizes dialogues as a necessary activity since their research is trying to solve complex societal challenges on a global level. These challenges are characterized by different opinions between stakeholders, different goals, and trade-offs. Dialogues can enable a better application of knowledge and can provide unexpected insights. Both of these can result in WUR's research having a bigger impact.

The WUR's ambition of stimulating dialogues sounds like a reasonable plan to increase inclusion, fairness and effectiveness of their research. However, a tweet by a WUR press officer could make you question the promising words within the WUR Strategic Plan 2018-2021. It was only in 2017 that WUR re-tweeted an article written by National Geographic called 'This tiny country feeds the world'. The article is about the agricultural success of the Netherlands, with Wageningen University at its center. It includes an infographic of where the university is spreading their knowledge by means of WUR-initiated programs. The arrows move only in one direction, already asserting the anti-dialogue nature of these programs (or at least National Geographic's perception of Wageningen University programs). Disseminating knowledge is markedly different from co-creating knowledge, and is therefore contradictory with the current plans of the WUR. It makes you wonder if WUR actually contributes to dialogues with international stakeholders.



A quick scan online shows that Wageningen University started organizing dialogues in 2017. From then, they have organized more or less 13 dialogues. 'So, why do you need a separate building for this?', I hear you asking. Apparently, the Dialogue Centre will also host Ph.D. graduations, inaugurations, symposia, and small-scale seminars. The dialogues that were organized were about various topics, ranging from

agroforestry to the energy transition. The majority was for employees or students of WUR and a smaller part included stakeholders from non-academic institutions. So far, only two dialogues included stakeholders from outside the Netherlands. One of them was a dialogue about 'food' as part of

by complex problems. By embracing the complexity and giving room for all voices to be heard, new insights should

the '100 years of WUR' celebration. The other one was only facilitated by WUR and about CRISPR-Cas. It is odd that a university aiming to tackle global challenges does not organize international dialogues more frequently.

Involving international stakeholders

To elaborate, if you compare the Wageningen University goals and their current performance regarding dialogues, there is a contradiction. How can we solve the global food crisis while only considering Dutch stakeholders? How to discuss the energy transition without considering the European context (including their main actors)? Dialogues are aiming to bring clarity and consensus in a world characterized

evolve. The exclusion of international stakeholders goes against this concept. Thereby the value of dialogues can be questioned.

Of course, the co-creation of knowledge does not only appear within the format of a dialogue. However, the dialogues that are organized should not be limited to Dutch stakeholders especially if you are presenting yourself by words of 'co-creation' and 'dialogue', while aiming to tackle global challenges. Let's hope that when the Dialogue Centre opens, more international dialogues will be organized. This way, we can truly benefit from this new collaborative research approach, and make WUR's research move inclusive, effective and fair.
